COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed for students who have mastered the grammatical structure of the language and are ready to expand and enlarge your language skills thus achieving a high degree in mastery in the four basic skills (reading, listening, speaking and writing). Oral and written production across genres will be analyzed and practiced, with a particular attention to the textual type, ie. narrative, descriptive, argumentative. Additionally, students will write a variety of texts -- from plot summaries to reports, short essays and reflections.

The course's integrated approach aims to develop all skills. In-class time will be devoted to not only the structure of the textbook, but also to speaking and practicing Spanish through a combination of group-based and individual activities, focusing on grammatical structures, language functions and vocabulary. Lessons also include wide range of realia and active learning which will take students to different areas of Barcelona to allow for authentic practice in real-life situations to allow students to acquire linguistic and intercultural skills. Local engagement is offered so learn about Spanish society, thus improving their understanding of host culture to see the ways in which culture and language intersect to unlock a wide range of intercultural tools to enhance living and studying abroad.

Class size rarely exceeds 15 students, what allows students to have sufficient opportunities to practice your spoken Spanish and receive personal attention from the instructor.

- Extract main ideas and supporting details of verbal discourse from course content with a focus on Spanish/Sevillian culture & society

<u>Active Learning Reports (10%)</u>: While developing your learning autonomy, you will have to complete <u>two assignments</u> based on <u>two</u> of these **Academic-Integrated Cultural Activities Program** experiences:

- Barcelona monuments: Local Gems.
- Cordoba excursion: Religious Mosaic of the Mezquita.
- Flamenco culture: A Vision of Flamenco.
- Granada excursion: Revisiting the Three Cultures.
- SHOUT activities: Great Views of the Great Valley.
- Spanish cuisine: Slice it –n- Dice It.
 Madrid excursion: Capital Pleasures.

Your work will be evaluated on the basis of accuracy of expression, connection with the class topics and analyzing cultural content.

Essay (10%): A long composition on a topic related to course content will be chosen from several options during the course. Comprehensive guidelines & suggestions will be distributed at the start of the course. Your work will be evaluated on the basis of accuracy of expression, integration of new vocabulary and creative content. As you write, draw on the structures and vocabulary of recent lessons. Avoid drafting a composition in English and then translating it into Spanish. Instead, creatively combine the Spanish models you have mastered so far.

**NOTE: Plagiarism is unacceptable: never copy your composition from another source. Always cite every source used in your papers, including sources obtained via the Internet. You are not allowed to ask anyone for help writing or even proofreading these compositions. The use of Internet translation services is considered plagiarism. Students who are guilty of plagiarism will be assigned a 0 for the activity and their home institution may be notified.

Mid-Term Exam (15%): The test is designed to establish the progress you are making towards meeting the course learning objectives listed above. It will evaluate two different aspects of the course: language skills and vocabulary display learned throughout the first half of the semester. The faculty will provide further information regarding the Mid-Term to assist students in their preparation. The Midterm Exam will take place during class time. Please be advised that there will be no make-up exams under any circumstance.

Cumultive Oral Activity (10%): Students will work individually to develop a final oral activity related to his/her experience in Spain and in this Spanish course. This task gives you an opportunity to practice your oral skills and to demonstrate the level of spoken Spanish you have achieved at the end of the term. The teacher will give you a list of possible questions and the rules of the interview. The Cumulative Oral Activity will take place at the end of the course. Please be advised that there will be no make-up oral appointments.

<u>Final Exam (15%)</u>: This comprehensive test is comprised of questions and exercises that test your abilities in important areas of language competency, especially listening skills. It will be administered on the last day of class. Please be advised that there will be <u>no make-up exams</u>.

<u>Field Studies (30%)</u>: There will be three engagement activities outside class where interaction with Spanish speakers is highlighted.

- Field Study#1: El Mercado tradicional español
- Field Study#2: ¿Conoces Sevilla?
- Field Study#3: Las Redes Sociales de la Información

The objective is to interact with locals requiring accurate language use in authentic situations where oral communication skills are practiced demonstrating language acquisition. These may include surveys on different topics, onsite research of local sites of interest and observations, but all activities have an assigned task set which includes both a work sheet and a reflection upon the data found. A final presentation will take place where in groups students present their collective findings in groups to show how it has informed their understanding of Spanish culture. **No late reports will be accepted**.
